The Gertrude Street Projection Festival: A unique public festival of projected media types, creating an unconventional art museum experience that reveals hidden aspects of the street. The event transforms Gertrude Street into a lit-up outdoor gallery, showcasing works by international projection artists, community organizations, and other general newcomers.

Big Design Market: The biggest market of its kind in Australia, the Big Design Market brings together the best of local and international design over three days. Held in the city's iconic Royal Exhibition Building, expect to soak up Melbourne culture and splurge on fashion and accessories, homewares, textiles, stationery and more! Free workshops are also available

Melbourne Festival: First running in 1986, Melbourne Festival is your opportunity to experience dance, theatre, music, visual arts, multimedia and outdoor events across the city. You can also attend a range of masterclasses, workshops and lectures led by acclaimed international artists.

White Night: Local, national, and international artists, musicians, and performers take to Melbourne's streets, parklands, laneways, public spaces, and cultural institutions for one night only each year, from dusk to dawn, in an all-night celebration of culture and creativity.

Nhan Ngai
(178 Swan St, Richmond VIC 3121)

Lunchtime crowds flock to Nhan Ngai for freshly-made rice paper rolls and banh mi. For up to \$3.90, you can choose between one of 10 rice paper roll fillings and six dipping sauces.

A1 Bakery
(643-645 Sydney Rd, Brunswick VIC 3056)

Catch the tram up Sydney Road to visit one of Melbourne's favourite bakeries. Although it may be hard to choose between the delicious range of pies, pizzas, breads and wraps. A1 also doubles as a Middle Eastern grocer, so stock up on goods such as oils, dips, spices and sweets before you leave.

Blue Mountain and Sydney Zoo Day

The Sydney Cricket Grounds

Ayam Goreng 99 (Kingsford)

TOP CULTURE FESTIVALS

There are plenty festivals and events in Australia to attend. Australia offers you moments of fun and some interesting festivals throughout the region, to experience good food, exciting music, a vibrant atmosphere, and an unforgettable time.

Adelaide Festival

The Adelaide Festival of Arts is an annual art festival which takes place in Adelaide in southern Australia in March. It is considered a leading cultural festival in Australia and is one of the most significant international festivals of the arts such as theater, dance, modern and classical music, and literature.

Melbourne International Comedy Festival

The festival runs every year from March to April and lasts four weeks in Melbourne. It welcomes hundreds of musicians from around the world. The festival has featured talent shows, performances, improvisational theatre, discussions, musical events, and art expositions.

Byron Bay Bluesfest

One of the biggest festivals in Australia is an Australian annual music festival held in Byron Bay, New South Wales, during the Easter weekend. The five-day festival of Blues Music is one of the leading contemporary music festivals in the world.

Vivid Sydney Winter Festival

A yearly festival of light, music and ideas celebrated in Sydney. The event is held in May and June. Vivid Sydney is a mix of light-sculptures and immersive digital work and a forum for the sharing of ideas through collective discussions with leading designers.

Research Your Visa and Residency Options

To stay in Australia when you finish your course, you will need to apply for a new visa or seek to gain permanent residency. Want to stay in Australia to work? You will have the opportunity to apply for one of several work visas. If you want to continue to live and work in Australia, you can apply for permanent residency (PR).

Education Institution's Career Support Services

Your education institution will have a range of career support services available for international students. You can expect to be able to access a job search, get help with resume and applications, and attend career events and workshops to help improve your employability skills.

Get Professional Work Experience

Completing work experience during your course is very important while you are at university so that you can stand out from other applicants when seeking work and gain skills you could use on the future job.

Networking

Keeping in touch with your classmates and society will be very helpful, especially if they have connections to a particular employer or industries and can recommend you. Join clubs on campus is such a good idea and of course, social media can be very helpful too, particularly LinkedIn.
